**CONTRIBUTING THOUGHTS FROM OUR PRESIDENT:**

Old beekeepers know the rhyme, but here it is for new beekeepers.

"A swarm in May is worth a load of hay. A swarm in June, a silver spoon,  
but a swarm in July is not worth a fly."

Here in our area of the country, the main, and best, nectar flows are over by July. So a swarm in July, if hived by the beekeeper, will typically need to be fed if it is to survive winter. Hence, a late summer swarm is a mixed blessing. If it survives winter healthy and strong, it is worth the trouble. If not, you know first-hand what those elders were talking about.

The easiest and best way to prevent swarming, although not guaranteed, is to make sure the bees have adequate space. If your honey supers are 70% full, add another one.

- Referenced from “**Beekeeping for dummies by Howland Blackiston from the Beekeeping Calendar for May:**
- Check for eggs/queen.
- Install new bees in hive
- Season’s first check for capped brood and brood pattern.
- Look for swarm cells
- Add queen excluder and honey supers
- Add supers for surplus honey
- Test for varroa mites
- Treat for varroa mites
