DID YOU KNOW?

 Honey bees are eusocial insects - many generations live together, many care for offspring that are not their own, and labor is divided amongst the members of their society. Worker honey bees perform many tasks from cleaning/polishing cells, making wax or royal jelly, guarding, foraging, and removing dead bees. Some workers may not perform all of these, and while they are generally determined by age and physical development, if there are not enough bees, old workers can do the "younger" jobs and young workers will fill in on the "older" jobs as soon as their bodies allow.

WHAT TO DO DURING DECEMBER

- Visit your apiary to check entrances and the area around them for signs of mouse damage or raccoon visits.
- Keep entrances clear of snow and debris so when the temps warm enough they can get out and fly.
- Add candy boards for supplemental winter feed if they might run short or not be able to move across frames to get to honey stores (it's easier to move straight up than to move across frames). If you have not placed some type of system to handle moisture condensation in the hive, it's not too late.
