The topic for the August meeting: Successful Overwintering. Our speaker will be Mr. Bob Hooker, from OSBA.

Here is his biography;

Bob Hooker, who began keeping honey bees in the 1970's, operates Daglow Apiary in Franklin County, Ohio. He and his wife Mary, live on a three acre homestead on the southeast side of Columbus where they have a large garden and the apiary. In addition to producing honey and other honey bee products they raise a large portion of the food they eat, practicing sustainable, organic gardening. Bob is past president of the Ohio State Beekeepers Association, the Lorain County (Ohio) Beekeepers Association, the Heartland Beekeepers Association, and the Harrison County Beekeepers Association and currently serves on the Central Ohio Beekeeper's Association (COBA) Board of Directors. He was Harrison County Apiary Inspector for six years. He has been involved in the OSBA Traveling Speakers program since its inception. Bob retired as pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Oberlin, Ohio in 2010 after thirty seven years of pastoral ministry In the East Ohio Conference of the United Methodist Church.

CONTRIBUTING THOUGHTS FROM PAUL DORGER:

The average lifespan of a worker bee in summer is six weeks. In the winter, with no foraging activity, a worker's average lifespan will approach 20 weeks - nearly five months. Since it takes 21 days from the time the queen lays a fertilized egg until it emerges as a worker, the eggs your queen lays in August will be the workers that get the colony through the winter.

In August you want to test for varroa mites, and, if necessary, treat using one of the many methods available. Only treat after you remove honey supers. A colony of bees will die during winter due to one of three reasons. First, disease; second, starvation; third, excessive moisture. To prevent starvation lift the back of your hive, if two 10 frame deeps, make sure it weighs at least 60 pounds. If not, you will need to feed sugar syrup, 2 parts sugar to one part water, to assist them.

A good insurance policy is to add a candyboard. The candyboard has two components, one is the candy the second is the frame to hold it. I made my own frames, see below for one that can be purchased, and I only use sugar and water for the candy. I don't add a pollen patty. The hardened sugar will absorb moisture during the winter, a good thing, and by doing so it makes it easier for the bees to consume should they run out of honey. Every time I open a hive in late winter and see how much of the candyboard has been eaten, I am glad I added it.

Honey Extractor Rental

Warren County Ohio Beekeepers has a honey extractor that can be rented by members for \$5.00 per day. The Maxant 6 frame extractor is stored in a storage unit near Monroe Ohio.

To reserve the extractor go to our website www.warrencountyohiobeekeepers.org. From the menu, select Members>Reserve Honey Extractor. This page will describe the procedure for cleaning the extractor and also allow you to enter your name, email address, date you would like to pick up the extractor and number of days you will be using the extractor.

Once you complete and send the reservation form, our treasurer will verify your membership and availability of the extractor for the desired dates. If all is OK you will receive an email from the treasurer. The email will contain a link to the storage facility contact information. It also will include a password that lets the facility know that you have been approved for the extractor rental. The facility contact will provide you with a temporary gate code for the storage facility, the storage unit number and the location of the key. The extractor has a large wooden platform that should be used as it stabilizes the extractor during operation.

Please return the extractor clean and sanitized per the instructions. Once you have returned the extractor select Members>Return Extractor from the website menu. Once you complete the form on this page you will be directed to Paypal for the rental amount.

Chicken and cold drinks will be provided. Please bring a dish to share.


